# CAR SEAT SAFETY 

Child Passenger Safety
AAP Recommendation
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Different Way to understand the car seat recommendation



1. Infant-only seats usually have a handle for carrying and can be snapped in and out of a base that is installed in the vehicle.
2. Convertible CSSs can be used either forward- or rearfacing
3. When children using infant-only seats reach the highest weight for their seat, they should continue to ride rearfacing in a convertible seat for as long as possible.
4. Most currently available convertible seats can be used rear-facing to at least 35 lb .
5. Combination CSSs are seats that can be used forwardfacing with a harness system and then, as a booster seat with the harness removed.
6. Several models of convertible and combination CSSs can accommodate children up to 65 or 80 lb when used forwardfacing.
7. Booster seats function by positioning the child so that both the lap and shoulder portions of the vehicle seat belt fit properly; the lap portion of the belt should fit low across the hips and pelvis, and the shoulder portion should fit across the middle of the shoulder
8. All infants and toddlers should ride in a rear-facing car safety seat (CSS) until they are 2 years of age or until they reach the highest weight or height allowed by the manufacturer of their CSS.
9. All children 2 years or older, or those younger than 2 years who have outgrown the rear-facing weight or height limit for their CSS, should use a forward-facing CSS with a harness for as long as possible, up to the highest weight or height allowed by the manufacturer of their CSS.
10. All children whose weight or height is above the forward-facing limit for their CSS should use a belt positioning booster seat until the vehicle lap-and-shoulder seat belt fits properly, typically when they have reached 4 feet 9 inches in height and are between 8 and 12 years of age.
11. When children are old enough and large enough to use the vehicle seat belt alone, they should always use lap-and-shoulder seat belts for optimal protection.
12. All children younger than 13 years should be restrained in the rear
